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Preamble

This report details the activities of the Department of Community Services and Tourism in the month of April 2021.

General

The provincial shutdown modified our Department's traditional April tasks. With the MMCC operating as a vaccination centre instead of a recreation facility, different challenges were presented to all staff of the Department. We hosted successful clinics throughout the month, as well as took advantage of some early nice weather to get a head start in the parklands and provide the community with these outdoor amenities at a time that these resources are critical to the health of residents.

Capital Projects

Beginning of Capital Projects

In April, Staff compiled final pricing and began on the smaller Department capital projects. In particular, we are finalizing an agreement to fund some upgrades at the MMCC that we are excited to announce when completed. Larger projects are being held off until the end of the shutdown order, with details coming to Council soon.

MMCC

MMCC Closure - Provincial Shutdown

While the MMCC has been closed for recreational activities, the facility has been used to both host the vaccine clinics as well as instructors broadcasting municipal programming over Zoom. Office staff have been working a combination of from home as well as at the facility to accommodate any community requests.

Parks and Trails

Parks Opening 2021

With the onset of nice weather in April, staff worked to open parks early in the season, completing full playground inspections as well as installing (distanced) swings and ensuring that the parks were ready to host residents for the season. As discussed in previous years, the Mission and Marina playgrounds do not pass inspection and require removal, which will be completed in partnership with the IS Department. From staff observations, parks are being used more than in previous years, likely due to the current COVID situation, which requires additional staff oversight to keep up with litter and other normal parks operation tasks.

Staff also closed, and reopened the playgrounds at the beginning of the month. Staff are required to keep up with the latest guidelines and restrictions and this sometimes requires quick transitions between closure and opening dependent on the guidance received by APH and the province. Examples of this communication can be found in **Appendix B.**

Marina Closure and Operational Changes

Due to the provincial shutdown, the Marina facility was also closed after staff clarified with APH some of the provisions and rules included in the shutdown orders. Specifics can be found in the public notice included in **Appendix C.**

Additionally, the Marina Operator declined to sign the 2021 Operations Contract, and therefore, based on the requirements with the lease with Small Craft Harbours, the Municipality is unable to use the business as a subcontractor to operate the facility. This required the Department to quickly shift into sole operation of the facility, which will have the primary difference of the Municipality being the sole collector of fees to the facility. This will have the positive effect of ensuring that all revenue generated at the facility remains within the Municipality, but the negative effect of a reduction of service levels as there is no staff present at the facility for the long hours that were kept by the Operator. Staff have rewritten the procedure for slip booking and have begun taking slip fees from the MMCC with assistance from the Finance Department. Booking forms are now available through our new website, and contactless options such as drop-off at the MMCC and e-transfer have been appreciated by residents who have booked slips so far. Advertising is also included in **Appendix C**.

Community Events and Recreation

Recreation Programs - April

Our online classes started in April, and have been very successful. We have continued with our Senior classes of Active Fit, Pilates and Functional Fit. With the online platform, we have been able to reach more participants, as our numbers are not limited by the current Provincial Regulations. Previous to going online, we were limited to 9 participants, and have nearly doubled that with our at home classes (see below).

Active Fit/Pilates – 17 Registered Participants Functional Fit – 10 Registered Participants

Senior Social is a new concept for the MMCC. It was previously offered through other Community Organizations through grants, but was unable to continue due to lack of funds. The MMCC currently runs it Fridays at 1:30-2:30 pm, and has different topics covered each week. Guest presenters such as the WFHT Dietician Justine Glover and Mme. Carolle Pitre have offered their expertise, and the sessions have been maxed out at 20 participants. Through these classes, the opportunity to plant lettuce gardens, and cook a plant based meal, with most supplies provided were very well received. These Sessions are offered through Zoom with an option for calling in on a Toll-free number.

The current fitness and social programs being offered are at no to little cost, thanks to the Social Services Relief Fund.

Wawa Recreation has worked with the Wawa Food Strategy Committee and the Community Garden, with partnerships and programming in mind. Planning is under way for the Community Better Challenge (Participaction's 50th year) to be held June 1-30. Various events are planned to get the community active. Wawa Recreation is working with the Wawa Family Health Team, Algoma Public Health and Superior Children's Centre on this venture.

Recreation Programming: Online Trials

Due to the stay at home orders, staff have transitioned as much programming as possible online. This includes seniors sessions, with a focus on activity and socialization that is often lacking due to the current climate. Staff have been impressed with the amount of positive feedback received, and the participation, as seen above, has exceeded our goals and expectations. It illustrates how important these connections are during the social and physical isolation brought on by the Pandemic.

Tourism

AKTA Summer Projections

The Algoma Kinniwabi Travel Association continues to expect a summer season that will mirror the experience of the region in 2020. Traffic across all platforms has increased between 25% to 45% between multiple tourism marketing offerings, and specifically online offerings have seen the largest increase, indicating a demographic shift towards a younger audience interested in travelling to the area. Staff continue to work with the local EDC and AKTA to see how we can respond to these trends given the effects of COVID.

Other Projects

Municipal COVID-19 Safety Plan

Staff have also worked on a small update to the safety plan regarding the employment of summer students. This update includes what training will be provided, as well as reinforces the importance of following public health guidance both within and outside the workplace. It will be presented to Council for acceptance and forms part of the Council responsibility for health and safety in the Municipality.

Funding and Grants

In the Spring and Summer, staff create more detailed work plans due to the more spread out and complex nature of the work being undertaken. The primary tasks for May include:



Harry McCluskie Municipal Marina is now tracking slips and launches with a new sticker system. All passes must be displayed prominently on the dash of a vehicle or boat. Stickers can either be stuck on or displayed on the dash

NOTICE COVID-19 MARINA CLOSURE

Effective immediately, the Harry McCluskie Municipal Marina is closed to the public in accordance with the Provincial Order under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* announced on April 18th.

The Province announced orders to close outdoor recreational amenities, including Marinas. It was confirmed by Algoma Public Health that all marinas are to be closed except for the purpose of:

- repairing or servicing boats or other watercraft
- placing boats or other watercraft in the water to be secured until the marina is open to the public
- services that enable people to access their place or residence or other property, to support government operations or services, or for the transportation of items by commercial barges

This closure affects the Marina docks, facilities, and pavilion.

The boat launch will remain open for use. All users must follow current Public Health guidelines when using the launch, including maintaining 2m distancing and limiting gatherings to members of your household only.

Municipal Staff will continue to provide the community with updates as the situation unfolds.
