

Wawa's Geological Story




The land beneath your feet has an ancient and constantly changing story to tell. The townsite of Wawa sits in the centre of an ancient volcano, the source of gold as well as iron for Wawa's Helen/MacLeod iron ore mine from 1899 to 1998. The massive mountain ranges have been miniaturized by mile thick sheets of ice that scoured the land over 3 separate Glacial periods, the last of which melted away 10,000 years ago. The samples in this cabinet are just a small sample of local rocks and ore bodies.This cabinet also includes fossilized rock and stones pushed by glaciers from places like Hudson Bay.

Wawa's Boreal Story



The Wawa landscape is at the transition point between the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Lowland and the vast Boreal Forest. As the Boreal Gateway we are home to rich flora and fauna that play important roles in the lifestyle, culture and economy of our diverse residents. Fish, fowl and mammals have nourished and clothed local communities for centuries. The plants and timber resources have been instrumental in providing food, shelter and commerce. The Boreal forest is our home and it is important for us to acknowledge the role it plays.

Wawa's Pre-Contact Story



The First Nations story on the Wawa landscape goes back through the ages. Copper artifacts found along ancient Lake Superior beaches around Wawa have been dated back 5000 years. These ancestors developed important trade routes, travel corridors and seasonal settlement sites throughout the land. The sample of artifacts in this cabinet, original place names, stories and the current members of Michipicoten First Nation remind us of the important place they continue to have in our community.

Wawa's Fur Trade Story



Wawa is home to a long and colourful fur trade history centred around the Michipicoten Post on the Michipicoten River near Michipicoten River Village. The Michipicoten First Nation community welcomed the first European explorer's to the area in the late 1600's. The First Nation excelled in trapping and survival skills. They seasonally occupied Michipicoten which is a strategic location on the East Shore of Superior where traditional canoe routes take you East, West and North to James/Hudson Bay along the Michipicoten/Missinaibi/Moose River route. French traders established the first post in 1725. The Northwest Company post took over, then was amalgamated with the Hudson Bay Company post in 1821. Michipicoten became headquarters for the Lake Superior District of the HBC until 1885 and closed in 1904.

Wawa's Mining Story




The ancient hills in the Wawa landscape have provided metals and resources for centuries. Copper was mined and fashioned into tools and ceremonial pieces during Wawa's earliest settlement period 5000 plus years ago.Superior copper is found throughout North America, traded with various communities across the continent. Wawa's first Gold Boom transformed the countryside in 1897 when William Teddy and Louise Towab discovered a rich vein on Wawa Lake. Iron ore was the heart and soul of Wawa during the entire 20th century when Algoma Ore Division operated the Helen, Magpie and MacLeod Mines. Wawa's gold and iron products are found worldwide and the rich mineral resources beneath your feet continue to be a part of our story.

Wawa's Transportation Story



How did you get here today? Did you paddle a canoe, hike a trail, take a boat, train or bush-plane? Before the Trans-Canada Highway was completed in 1960, all of these methods of travel transported residents, tourists, goods and supplies through the Wawa area. The canoe routes and portages followed rivers and waterways allowing travel, trade and communication. Wawa is home to a lighthouse and Michipicoten Harbour on Lake Superior where the Algoma Central Railway and Steamship Line operated for over 100 years. Wagon tote roads, shipwrecks, railway construction camps and ancient portages continue to be a part of Wawa's transportation history.
