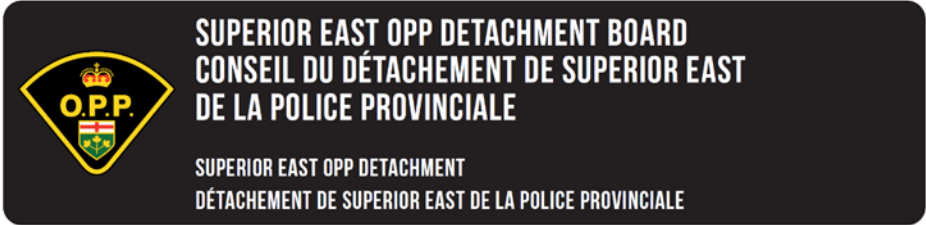

7.1 Financial Budget

Heather Rainville, Board Treasurer, reported a bank balance of \$29,633.18 and October expenditures totaling \$5,366.82. The Chair was reminded that he must attend the Northern Credit Union to sign the required financial documents.

7.2 Approval of 2025 Budget Estimates (resolution)

M. O'Neill presented the 2026 Budget Estimate, noting an anticipated surplus going into the new fiscal year. A recommendation was brought forward to reduce the standard Municipal Board membership contributions from \$7,500 to \$2,500 for 2026. It was clarified that, in a typical year, municipal contributions should be approximately \$4,000.

A suggestion was made that Municipalities be invoiced the full contribution amount for 2026, with a corresponding credit applied from the surplus. The Board agreed with this approach.

The 2026 Budget also includes funding for the purchase of a new computer to allow the Board's financial records to be managed independently from municipal systems.

7.5 Quarterly Report – Detachment Commander Fellingner

Detachment Commander Fellingner presented his quarterly report, highlighting a 13.4% increase in Highway Traffic Act charges and emphasizing the continued importance of proper training for new recruits to improve traffic engagement.

He shared that the 2025–2026 Festive RIDE programs would begin on November 20th across the various communities, with a strategic focus on areas with higher likelihoods of impaired driving.

A staffing update was provided, noting that the detachment is now fully staffed with both recruits and experienced officers. A new Community Engagement Officer has also been appointed: Constable Robert Sanchioni, of the Chapleau detachment, has taken on this role as has already begun engaging with local schools.

The timeline for a new detachment building has been pushed back to 2089, causing concern among local officials, including Mayor Pilon, who is seeking answers. Mayor Bignucolo, of Chapleau, is also pursuing a new Detachment in Chapleau.

D.C. Fellingner recently attended and awards ceremony where 3 local Wawa members were awarded for their quick response and role in the 2024 Credit Union incident

7.7 Superior East Detachment Action Plan 2026-2029 – Draft for Comment

Detachment Commander K. Fellingner shared the draft 2026-2029 Action Plan. He advised that a community survey was distributed to community partners and stakeholders (local schools and school boards, Situation Table members, Hospital executive leaders, Municipality employees, Mayors and council), and the feedback gathered from the 14 responses was incorporated into the plan.

Drug-related offenses were raised as the primary community issue, with property crimes and intimate partner violence tied for second. The survey results also emphasized the importance of mental health and addiction support services as effective crime prevention strategies. Additionally, there was a call for more police presence in community events and schools to foster engagement.

The board was instructed to provide feedback on the Action Plan by December 10th. The finalized Action Plan should be ready by January 13th with a potential meeting to finalize comments scheduled for that date.

Legislative and Regulatory Changes Effective January 1, 2026

Information Posted on OAPSB website

Legislative and regulatory change is a constant feature of the environment in which police governance boards operate. While not every update requires action, understanding what has changed and how it may affect governance responsibilities is essential to effective oversight.

This notice is intended to support awareness and informed decision-making. It is not intended to be a legal interpretation, nor does it replace professional advice. Rather, it provides a practical overview of key changes that came into effect on January 1, 2026, with a focus on what boards may wish to understand, monitor, or discuss as part of their governance role.

Boards are not expected to be subject-matter experts in every area outlined below. The goal is to support thoughtful oversight, informed questions, and constructive dialogue with police leadership and partners.

1. Employment, Recruitment, and Labour-Related Changes

Several legislative updates now in effect clarify employer responsibilities related to recruitment, transparency, and workforce practices.

1.1 Recruitment and Job Posting Requirements

What has changed

Recent updates to employment legislation introduce clearer expectations regarding recruitment practices, including:

- Increased transparency in job postings, including the inclusion of compensation or salary ranges.
- Clearer requirements for maintaining records related to recruitment and hiring activities.
- Greater emphasis on consistency and fairness throughout the hiring process.

These changes are intended to promote transparency, reduce bias, and support equitable access to employment opportunities.

Why this matters for police boards

Police service boards may:

- Directly recruit for board, administrative, or governance support roles.
- Provide oversight of recruitment practices used by the police service.
- Be asked to demonstrate that appropriate governance and risk management practices are in place.

Even where recruitment is operationally delegated, Municipal and First Nations' boards retain accountability for governance frameworks and oversight expectations.

What boards may wish to do

- Confirm that job posting templates include required information, including compensation ranges where applicable for board hires and service hires.
 - Ensure recruitment records are being maintained in line with current requirements.
 - Ask how recruitment policies and practices have been updated.
 - Confirm alignment when using external recruiters or third-party support.

1.2 Labour Mobility and Workforce Access

What has changed

Recent federal and provincial initiatives have strengthened labour mobility across jurisdictions. These changes are intended to reduce unnecessary barriers and improve access to skilled workers, particularly in regulated or specialized roles.

Why this matters for police boards

While sworn policing roles remain subject to specific legislative and regulatory requirements, labour mobility changes may affect:

- Civilian and professional staff recruitment for the board and for the service
- Competition for specialized skill sets
- Workforce planning and retention strategies

What boards may wish to do

- Understand whether labour mobility changes affect civilian or technical roles within the board or the service.
 - Consider how these changes may influence recruitment strategies and workforce planning.
 - Ensure hiring practices remain fair, transparent, and compliant.

2. Occupational Health and Safety Updates

2.1 Workplace Cleaning and Record-Keeping Requirements

What has changed

Employers are now required to maintain records confirming that workplace washrooms are cleaned at prescribed intervals. These records must be available upon inspection.

Why this matters for police boards

Boards may oversee or occupy administrative spaces and may share responsibility for ensuring compliance. Even where facilities management is delegated, governance oversight remains important.

What boards may wish to do

- Confirm that appropriate cleaning records are being maintained by asking your Police Leadership for an update to ensure they are compliant.
 - Understand who is responsible for monitoring compliance.
 - Ensure clarity between board and service responsibilities and any external contractors.

2.2 Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) on Construction Projects

What has changed

Certain construction projects are now required to have an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) on site, depending on project duration and workforce size.

Why this matters for police boards

This may affect new builds, renovations, or other capital projects overseen or approved by the board.

What boards may wish to do

- Confirm whether current or planned projects meet the criteria requiring an AED.
 - Ensure safety requirements are incorporated into project planning and oversight with contractors.
 - Include this consideration in capital project reporting and risk discussions.

3. Public Safety and Enforcement Updates

Impaired Driving Enforcement

What has changed

Updates to provincial impaired driving legislation affect how roadside enforcement and related procedures are carried out.

Why this matters for police boards

While boards do not direct operational policing, these changes may influence:

- Enforcement activity and public interactions
- Community expectations and public messaging
- The nature of questions or concerns raised with the board

What boards may wish to do

- Request a briefing from the Chief or Detachment Commander on how changes are being implemented locally.

- Understand any anticipated impacts on service delivery.
 - Ensure public communications are clear and consistent.

4. Broader Regulatory and Policy Environment

Additional federal and provincial regulatory changes also came into effect on January 1, 2026. These include updates related to labour regulation, benefits administration, and sector-specific compliance requirements.

While these changes may not require immediate board action, they form part of the broader operating environment in which police services operate.

What boards may wish to do

- Maintain general awareness of emerging regulatory trends.
 - Discuss with your Police Leadership
 - Consider implications for workforce planning and inter-agency collaboration.
 - Monitor for future guidance or sector-specific impacts.

Moving Forward

OAPSB will continue to monitor legislative and regulatory developments and will share updates as appropriate. These changes will also inform future tools, resources, and learning opportunities designed to support effective police governance.

To support shared understanding, OAPSB will be hosting ongoing discussion groups between January and March. These sessions will provide space for conversation, questions, and peer learning related to the updates outlined above as well as any general inquiries around Governance and your roles and responsibilities.

Subject: Province-Wide Police Recruitment Campaign – Final Results and Next Steps for Boards

We are excited to share the Final Report from the Province-Wide Police Recruitment Campaign, *Answer the Call*, delivered in collaboration with police sector partners and Earnscliffe Strategies.

The campaign exceeded expectations across all key measures and demonstrated strong, province-wide interest in policing careers. Nearly 27,000 qualified leads were generated, almost double the original target, with strong engagement across all regions of Ontario, including smaller and rural communities

Importantly, performance data confirms that candidates were not only clicking on ads but spending meaningful time reviewing detailed information about policing careers and next steps.

Although proactive paid media has concluded, remaining campaign funds have been allocated to **extend the campaign website and email engagement until the end of June 2026**. This allows continued momentum without additional cost and provides boards and services with a stable, high-quality resource to support recruitment conversations.

What this means for Police Governance Boards

This campaign is **not an operational recruitment program**, and boards are not expected to recruit candidates directly. However, the results provide valuable insight and tools that boards can use to guide and support their police services in a governance and advisory capacity.

Boards are encouraged to:

- 1. Familiarize themselves with the campaign results**

The Final Report highlights what prospective candidates are responding to, particularly clear, practical information about policing roles, expectations, and pathways. This can inform board-level discussions about recruitment challenges and sustainability.

- 2. Use the campaign website as a trusted reference point**

The *Answer the Call* website provides consistent, province-wide information on policing careers and links candidates to local services. Boards may reference this resource when engaging with services or responding to public inquiries about policing careers.

3. Encourage alignment with local recruitment efforts

Boards may wish to ask their police service how provincial leads are being connected to local recruitment processes, including information sessions, Q&As, or application support. The campaign data offers a helpful starting point for these advisory conversations.

4. Amplify existing campaign materials where appropriate

Boards that communicate publicly may choose to share campaign content through existing channels such as newsletters, websites, or community updates. Pre-developed creative assets and messaging are available, and use is optional and at each board's discretion.

5. Treat the Final Report as an ongoing resource

Rather than a one-time update, the campaign findings can support longer-term discussions around recruitment trends, candidate expectations, and workforce planning.

The success of this campaign reinforces that interest in policing is strong across Ontario when information is clear, accessible, and realistic. We, along with our partners in this project, will continue to support boards by sharing sector-wide insights and resources that strengthen informed governance and recruitment oversight.

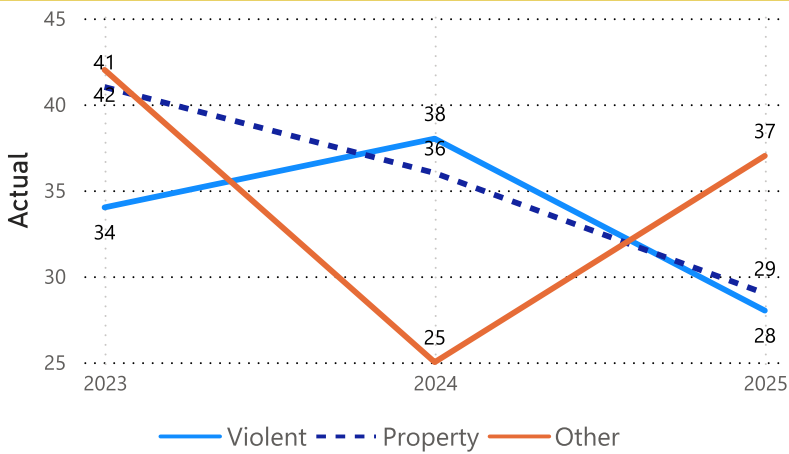

Referrals Accepted (%) by Age Group

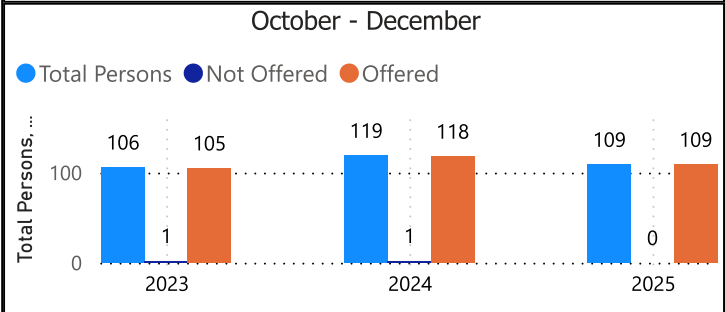
