

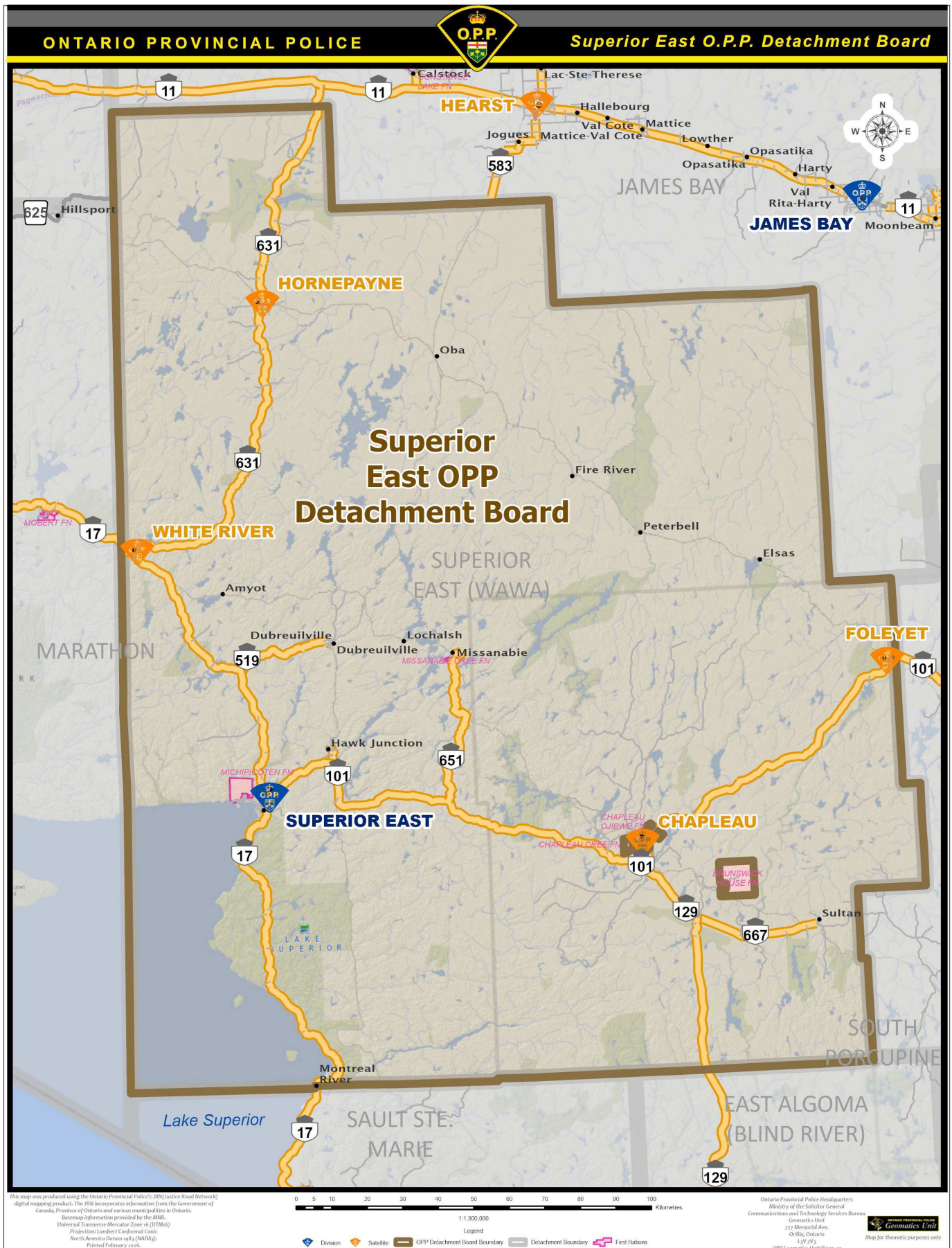

# Message from the Detachment Commander

I am pleased to present the Superior East 2025 Detachment Board Annual Report. This report provides crime, traffic enforcement, and community well-being data, and highlights key initiatives and achievements from the past year.

The year 2025 marked the final year of the 2023–2025 Superior East Detachment Action Plan, and this report outlines our final progress and results under that plan.

I am proud of the professionalism and dedication demonstrated by the members of the Superior East Detachment, whose efforts continue to enhance public safety and community well-being across our region.

Throughout 2025, the Superior East Detachment advanced the objectives of the Ontario Provincial Police Corporate Business Plan through collaborative, intelligence-led, and community-focused policing, with a continued emphasis on public safety, partnerships, and community well-being.

## **Partnering with Indigenous Policing Services**

We remain committed to strong, respectful partnerships with the Nishnawbe Aski Police Service (NAPS) and the Anishinabek Police Service (APS). In 2025, we collaborated on cross-jurisdictional initiatives targeting drug trafficking and repeat offenders. Through information sharing, coordinated enforcement, and collaborative investigations, we strengthened our collective ability to address organized criminal activity while respecting roles, authorities, and community priorities.

## **Technology-Enabled Policing**

The Superior East Detachment continued to leverage technology to support evidence-based policing, transparency, and safety. The use of body-worn cameras, in-car cameras, and automated licence plate recognition (ALPR) enhanced investigative processes, supported officer and public safety, and reinforced public confidence in policing.

## **Integrated Response for Persons in Crisis**

Ongoing collaboration with local health-care partners supported safe, respectful, and efficient police-hospital transitions for persons in crisis. These partnerships improve outcomes for vulnerable individuals, promote appropriate use of police resources, and enhance safety for hospital staff, patients, and responding officers.

## **Collaborative Community Problem-Solving**

We continued participation in the Wawa and Chapleau Situation Tables, working alongside community partners to support early intervention, shared problem-solving, and coordinated responses for individuals and families at elevated risk. This approach aligns with OPP priorities related to community safety and risk mitigation.



## **Community Engagement, Youth Outreach, and School Safety**

Supporting youth safety and early intervention remains a key priority. In response to community concerns, we increased police presence and patrols in local schools, strengthening relationships with students and staff, enhancing school safety, and improving accessibility to officers in non-enforcement settings. These interactions created opportunities for youth to raise concerns and seek guidance outside of call-for-service situations.

In late November 2025, we further strengthened engagement efforts by filling the vacant Community Safety Officer position with a Community Engagement Officer. Schools across Superior East continue to request tailored programming, including online safety, cyberbullying, personal safety, bullying, and drug awareness, reaching students from kindergarten through grade 12 and supporting prevention and relationship-building.

### **Looking Ahead**

In 2026, we will release our new 2026-2029 Superior East Detachment Action Plan. This is the first action plan developed under the *Community Safety and Policing Act* (CSPA). We are working closely with our Superior East Detachment Board and engaging with community members to ensure the needs of our communities are reflected in the commitments we make for the next four years.

Development of the 2026-2029 Superior East Detachment Action Plan will coincide with the creation of the 2026-2029 OPP Strategic Plan creating organizational alignment.

As we look ahead to emerging challenges and new opportunities in policing and community safety, our detachment members remain committed to our mission to serve our communities, protect our citizens, uphold the law, and preserve public safety.

Clearance rates remained low due to the inherent challenges of property crime investigations, which often involve limited evidence or delayed reporting.</p> <p>Officers continued targeted patrols in high-risk areas, supported by analytical products, hotspot mapping, and the Offender Management Apprehension Program (OMAP) to monitor repeat offenders. Public awareness and prevention efforts remained critical, with residents encouraged to secure property, utilize affordable camera technology, report suspicious activity, and submit information through Crime Stoppers. Shared responsibility between police and the community remains essential to sustaining crime reduction.</p> |

Recognizing the impact of CMVs on roadway safety, the detachment expanded its enforcement capacity with the certification of two frontline officers through the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA). These officers worked in close partnership with Ministry of Transportation Ontario (MTO) officials to conduct joint enforcement operations, with a focus on CMV inspections, mechanical fitness, driver compliance, and regulatory adherence. These coordinated initiatives contributed to safer roadways and enhanced accountability for commercial operators.</p> <p>To further support CMV enforcement, additional frontline officers received specialized CMV-related training, increasing their ability to identify and address safety concerns during roadside stops and investigations. Frontline officers played an active role in community engagement by conducting foot patrols, attending local schools, participating in community events, and maintaining a visible police presence across the Superior East Cluster.</p> <p>Officers continued to work collaboratively with community-based organizations, including the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA), Wawa and Area Victim Services (WAVS), and Chadwic Home, to support vulnerable individuals and connect victims with appropriate local resources. The detachment also maintained participation in the Wawa and Chapleau Situation Tables, supporting early intervention, coordinated responses, and enhanced community safety.</p> <p>While formal CSO-led programming was limited in 2025, ongoing officer-led engagement ensured continued relationship-building, trust, and accessibility within the communities served. 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| <p>Support our Indigenous policing partners and communities.</p> | <p>In 2025, the Superior East Detachment remained committed to supporting Indigenous policing partners and First Nation communities through respectful collaboration, intelligence-led policing, and operational support. The detachment continued to provide frontline and investigative assistance to Indigenous communities when requested, ensuring equitable and responsive public safety services.</p> <p>A key focus in 2025 was joint drug-trafficking investigations conducted in partnership with the CSCU and First Nation policing partners, including the Nishnawbe Aski Police Service (NAPS). These investigations involved active intelligence sharing, coordinated operational planning, and the provision of specialized policing services to support thorough, evidence-based investigations targeting drug distribution and related criminal activity.</p> <p>The detachment deployed OPP specialty services, including the Emergency Response Team (ERT), Canine Unit (K9), and Forensic Identification Services, as required to assist Indigenous policing partners during complex investigations and enforcement operations. These coordinated efforts strengthened investigative capacity and reinforced strong working relationships and shared accountability.</p> <p>Superior East members continued to participate in Indigenous Awareness Training, supporting culturally informed policing and respectful, professional engagement. 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## Other Community Updates

### **Ontario Government Commitment – New Superior East OPP Detachment (Wawa)**

The Ontario government has committed to the construction of a new, state-of-the-art Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment in Wawa. This modern facility is designed to meet the evolving operational demands of frontline policing and will provide Superior East OPP officers, civilian staff, and volunteers with the infrastructure and tools required to effectively serve the community.

Once completed, the new detachment will enhance operational efficiency, improve service delivery, and strengthen the OPP's capacity to respond to crime and public safety concerns across the region. This investment reflects the Province's ongoing commitment to supporting law enforcement and fostering safer communities in northern Ontario.

### **Interagency Collaboration – Highway Safety and Emergency Preparedness**

In response to ongoing community and municipal concerns regarding year-round highway closures due to weather events and maintenance activities, Superior East OPP continues to proactively collaborate with local mayors, the Ministry of Transportation (MTO), and Ledcor. Through regular information sharing and coordinated planning, partners work collectively to enhance public safety, improve situational awareness, and support timely, consistent messaging to the public during highway closures and emergency events.

# Policing Hours

The OPP has developed a Service Delivery Model (SDM) in response to several reviews and audit recommendations. The SDM is designed to:

- Promote officer wellness through balanced workloads
- Determine adequate staffing levels at each detachment
- Ensure the continued delivery of adequate and effective policing services in accordance with the *Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA)*

To support SDM implementation, the OPP is undertaking a multi-year staffing strategy to address required increases in detachment personnel. This model supports the OPP’s ability to:

- Respond effectively to increasing calls for service
- Maintain safe communities through proactive patrols and community engagement
- Meet municipal expectations for police visibility

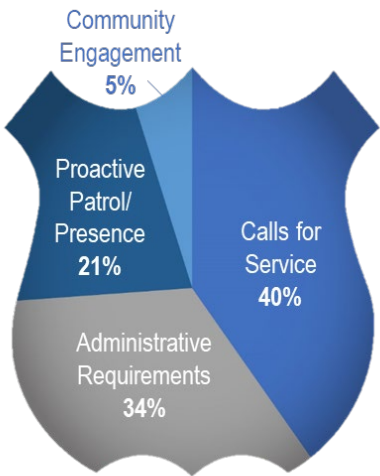


Figure 1: Service Delivery Model Provincial Target

To monitor progress and guide detachment-level planning, the OPP has established time allocation targets for provincial constables (Figure 1). These targets reflect how time should ideally be distributed by the end of the SDM staffing strategy.

The targets are based on a provincial average, and variations are expected between detachments due to differences in geography, operational structure, recruitment and leave of absence rates.

Detachments may face challenges in achieving these targets, but progress is expected as scheduling, data quality and strategic deployment continue to improve.
