It was noted that sergeant vacancies remain a concern, with three positions presently unfilled and upcoming retirements anticipated to further impact staffing levels. Temporary acting assignment and competition processes are being considered as measures to address the vacancies.

 Questions were raised regarding the high number of assaults and firearm-related offences this quarter. D.C. Fellinger explained that the numbers are higher because of a recently executed warrant in which several firearms were selzed.

This budget includes operating costs of the Superior East OPP Detachment Board. It does not include policing costs.

In recognition of the Municipality of Wawa contributing administration and bookkeeping for the Board in 2026, the value of these services is set at \$2,500 in 2025.

The apportionment of operating costs of the Superior East OPP Detachment Board for 2026 shall be divided equally among partner communities as follows:

\$2,500 each for White River, Wawa, Hornepayne, Dubreuilville and Chapleau.

Any unspent funds at year-end will be brought forward to future year budget.

Each participating municipality shall provide its share of the 2025 budget by February 27, 2026, or be charged a 1.5% monthly interest charge.

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Message from the Detachment Commander

I am pleased to present the 2026-2029 SUPERIOR EAST *Detachment Action* Plan. This action plan has been prepared and adopted per the *Community Safety and Policing Act*, 2019 (CSPA) and in alignment with the Ontario Provincial Police 2026-2029 Strategic Plan.

The 2026-2029 SUPERIOR EAST (WAWA) *Detachment* Action Plan outlines commitments, actions, and desired outcomes for the detachment over the next four years. It addresses how we will provide adequate and effective policing in our area and will meet the needs of the communities we serve. To reflect these priorities, the plan is organized in three sections:



- Crime
- Roadways, Waterways and Trails
- Community Well-Being

The plan also includes qualitative and quantitative performance objectives and indicators so we can appropriately measure the outcomes of our actions.

The 2026-2029 SUPERIOR EAST *Detachment* Action Plan was created in consultation with relevant stakeholders.

- We met with our OPP Detachment Board the Superior East OPP Detachment Board and we have integrated their identified objectives and priorities into our detachment's action plan:
 - Community Focus Enhance police engagement with youth by increasing officer presence in schools and supporting initiatives that help officers better understand the challenges youth face.
 - O **Social Issues** Increase public awareness of social issues by educating the community about the challenges faced by individuals experiencing mental health concerns and substance use issues, as well as the resources available to support them. Collaborate with community partners to develop coordinated strategies that effectively address and mitigate these issues.
 - Crime Reduce harm and victimization related to violent crime, with a particular focus on intimate partner violence. Work with communities and schools to design and implement proactive, evidence-based strategies to disrupt illicit drug activity and reduce incidents of property crime.
 - o **Roadways, Trails, and Waterways** With substantial growth in the mining and forestry sectors, commercial motor vehicle traffic has increased significantly in our communities and on our highways. Additional focus is required to ensure public safety through public education on legal requirements and responsibilities when travelling on highways, combined with enhanced police engagement and targeted enforcement initiatives.
- We engaged with municipal representatives in our area to understand their concerns and priorities.
- We engaged with the First Nation Band Chief and Council in our area to better understand their concerns and priorities.

- Michipicoten First Nation identified their priorities as enhancing positive police relationships and traffic safety education with youth and community members, maintaining zero tolerance for impaired driving, drug trafficking, and related incidents.
- We engaged with school boards, community organizations, businesses, and other members of public to inform this plan.
- To ensure this Action Plan aligns with the needs and priorities of our community, a targeted survey was distributed to key stakeholders, including school boards, hospitals, detachment board members, mayors, and municipal councillors. Feedback highlighted a desire for:
 - o A reduction in illicit drug trafficking
 - Increased traffic enforcement
 - o Additional police patrols, including foot and trail patrols
 - o A more visible presence at community events

Additionally, concerns related to intimate partner violence, drug-related activity, and property crime were consistently identified as top public safety priorities.

The 2026-2029 SUPERIOR EAST *Detachment* Action Plan is the first action plan prepared under the CSPA. Detachment Board Annual Reports will continue to be enhanced to reflect the updated reporting requirements.

I am proud of the work we do and the relationships we have built at SUPERIOR EAST *Detachment*, and I look forward to our growth and achievements in implementing then 2026-2029 SUPERIOR EAST *Detachment* Action Plan.

Our Detachment


The Superior East OPP Detachment serves a vast and diverse region located along the east shore of Lake Superior, encompassing areas within both the District of Algoma and the District of Sudbury. Covering just over 50,000 square kilometres, the detachment's area of responsibility includes a permanent population of approximately 7,100 residents, which grows significantly during the summer months with the influx of transient workers and travellers. The administrative office is situated on Highway 17 in Wawa and is supported by satellite offices in White River, Hornepayne, Chapleau, and Foleyet. In addition to these communities, the detachment also provides policing services to Dubreuilville, Hawk Junction, and Missinabie. Overall service delivery spans eight municipalities and townships, five First Nations communities, and 356 unincorporated townships. The detachment directly polices two First Nations communities and supports three others—Brunswick House, Chapleau Cree, and Chapleau Ojibwe First Nations—which are primarily served by the Nishnawbe-Aski Police Service (NAPS).

The region is connected by several major transportation routes, including Trans-Canada Highway 17 and Highways 101, 129, 519, 651, and 631, which provide links between northeastern Ontario communities and southern parts of the province. Maintaining highway safety along these heavily travelled corridors remains a key priority.

The Superior East area is also a well-known tourism destination, offering exceptional snowmobiling and ATV trail systems, world-class opportunities for boating, kayaking, camping, and hiking, and access to some of the most scenic natural beaches along the northeastern shore of Lake Superior. Provincial parks, outstanding hunting and fishing, and a thriving four-season tourism industry further enhance the area's appeal. The detachment also serves regions with significant mining and forestry operations, along with numerous public-sector employers such as schools and hospitals.

At the heart of the Superior East Detachment is its dedicated personnel. Both officers and civilian staff are deeply embedded within their communities, often residing in the areas they serve. Their commitment extends beyond policing, as they actively volunteer, coach, participate in, and support local events alongside their families, strengthening community relationships and enhancing the overall safety and well-being of the region.
